

# Support Services TRIO

Summer 2019 was a great time for many Student Support Services TRIO students to experience various internships. Andrew Robertson accepted an all-expense paid internship at Binghamton University in New York. Brian Bibbins had the opportunity to do research on scientific computing in Education. Reginell Meridy participated in SUNO's research program, "Student Opportunities in Aerospace Related Research." Here is what they had to say about their experiences.

#### Andrew Robertson



This summer I was given the opportunity to work as a research intern at Binghamton University. I worked in the College of Pharmacy in the office of Dr. Anthony DiPasqua, a cutting edge research scientist. Graduate Assistant Mengwei Sun was given the task of being my personal lab trainer. Mengwei taught me how to culture

and maintain cells, how to prepare liposomal nanoparticles for drug encapsulation and western blotting techniques. That the privilege of being able to sit in on lab briefings and strategies to help further the labs' research. Dr. DiPasqua has offered to write a letter of recommendation for me and has advised me to consider pursuing my MD/PhD in Upstate New York. He also has invited me to continue to work in his lab in the future. This has truly been an amazing experience and I would recommend anyone in TRIO, Student Support Services to seek this opportunity and take advantage of it.

#### **Brian Bibbins**

My research took place at Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York and it relates to scientific computing in education, using computer coding to assist in educational experiments. Science used to be experiments and theory, now it is experiments, theory and computations. The computational approach to understanding nature and technology currently is flowering in many fields, such as physics, geophysics, astrophysics, chemistry, biology and most engineering disciplines. I learned to use computer coding and then I had the opportunity to teach Long Island high school students computational methods where the techniques were explained through examples. My goal was to teach principles and ideas that carry over from field to field. The students learned basic methods and how to implement them. I also collected data on how well the students were able to process and effectively use coding in their experiments. With this data, I will be able to tell if scientific computing should be taught in high schools in America.



#### Reginell Meridy

This summer, I participated in SUNO's research program, "Student Opportunities in Aerospace Related Research," also known as SOARS. In this program, students worked on projects that pertained to aerospace topics. Several of the topics or projects dealt with Mars' soil/surface. My project was about determining if bacteria will interact negatively with Mars' soil. When researching, I like to discover or learn something new that could be beneficial to what I would need in my field of study. After graduation, I hope to become a doctor or nurse to help those around me. I have tried to get as much experience in laboratory work, as possible to make myself more marketable in the real world. This research opportunity has allowed me to sharpen my research skills and gain an interest in bacteriology. I am grateful to learn amazing topics, he surrounded by amazing people, and to develop the skill of experimentation.



In addition, Briante Brumfield successfully completed her summer research internship at Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium (LUMCON) under the supervision of Dr. Abigail Bockus, assistant professor of Biology at LUMCON. The internship was sponsored by SUNO MSEIP-CCEM and Sea Grants.

The SUNO School of Social Work is one among 10 institutions across the country to receive the five-year Social Work Health Care Education and Leadership Scholars (HEALS) grant from the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE), the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) and the New York Community Trust. The Social Work HEALS grant aims to develop the next generation of healthcare social work who will lead efforts to address system-level changes, heighten awareness of prevention and wellness, and discuss the issues of structural racism that are embedded in social institutions.

This program, directed by Dr. Derrick Freeman, assistant professor of Social Work, will support two students in the bachelor's program and two students in the master's program for the 2019 – 2020 academic year. Each student will commit to focused health-care social work education, a health-care field placement and travel to a 1.5-day health-care social work education and policy event in Washington, D.C. In addition, the program will support the SUNO School of Social Work HEALS field instructors to attend the national conference of the annual Society for Social Work Leadership in Healthcare.

The following students were selected as HEALS Scholars for the 2019-2020 academic school year and will receive a \$4,000 scholarship: Trinette Bolding (MSW student); Tremeka Coleman (MSW student); Amy H. Flesh (BSW student); and Tiawana Jones (BSW student).

MSW student Maya Edwards served as moderator of the first Youth Crime Summit hosted by Einstein Charter School Aug. 24. This was the first time that Maya served her community in this capacity. The summit included panelists radio personality Oliver Thomas, New Orleans Councilwoman Cyndi Nguyen and distinguished Einstein High School students.



Due to the recent mass shooting at the Walmart in El Paso, TX, SUNO Campus Police began offering active shooter training to the community. Campus Police trainers gave an Active Shooter Presentation at the Walmart on Chef Menteur Highway Aug. 20. Presentations are scheduled in September for the Pontchartrain Park Neighborhood Association. These presentations are a component of the SUNO Campus Police Community Policing Program and are designed to prevent panic and better prepare individuals in the event of an active shooter incident.



Dr. Murty S. Kambhampati, Biology professor, has secured the \$14,000 Virginia Ponds grant from Noel Blackburn, University Relations Program Manager, Office of Educational Programs (OEP) at Brookhaven National Laboratory, Upton, NY. The funds are being used to support Maya Brooks, Biology senior, for Fall 2019. This semester-long internship will allow Maya to continue her research on 4-Poster Tick Management Project under the supervision and mentoring of Dr. Tim Green. BNL will cover Maya's stipends, travel and housing for the entire fall semester. Maya started her Co-Op Internship Aug. 25 at BNL. The internship will end in December.

The stagnant water located under the train trestle at Press and Leon C. Simon Drives has been responsible for many automobile accidents, slips and falls. On Aug. 26, SUNO Campus Police worked out an agreement with the New Orleans Department of Public Works to begin repairing the leak that is causing the water to pool beneath the trestle.

On Aug. 12, Dr. Illya Tietzel (principal investigator) and Drs. Mostafa Elaasar, Rachid Belmasrour and Yi Zhen (co-investigators) received the \$20,000 NASA LaSPACE HBCU Institutional Scholars (HIS) award, "Student Opportunities in Aerospace Related Research at SUNO (SOARS)" to lead undergraduate research related to Mars soil, 3-D printing, microfluidics, and tissue lab chips.

Three research mentees of Drs. Mostafa Elaasar, Rachid Belmasrour and Illya Tietzel submitted research asbtracts to the 2019 Annual Biomedical Research Conferences of Minority Students (ABRCMS). The students are Roshaun Mitchell-Cleveland, Soriah Cleveleand and Reginell Meridy.

Dr. Murty S. Kambhampati served as a panelist on the "BNL Collaboration Workshop," moderated by Dr. Ken White, Office of Educational Programs on Aug. 6. The theme was threefold: "How to be successful at BNL," "Factors Affecting Performances by Females in Graduate Schools" and "BNL's Policy on Minority Serving Institutions.



Dr. Igwe E. Udeh, Dean and Alvin James Lawson Endowed Professor of Business, and Cynthia Beaulieu, director of the Small Business Development & Management Institute (SBDMI) participated in a regional economic development focus group at the Greater New Orleans (GNO) Inc. office Aug.13. This focus group was part of the first phase of due diligence and research for a Web site project that GNO Inc. is embarking upon with *Development Counsellors International (DCI)* – the leader in economic development talent strategy and marketing of places.

The goal was to gain insight from the participants about the region's best talent and relocatable talent pool, quality of life assets, opportunities and challenges. The focus group will help inform the *Development Counsellors International* strategy for a new GNO Inc. Web site, the goal of which is to create a digital space that better serves the Greater New Orleans region's relocating and prospective talent, investor companies and regional corporate decision makers from human resource directors to chief executive officers.

MyLise Givens, who graduated from Southern University at New Orleans in May 2019, has been accepted into the Master of Arts program at Savanna College of Art and Design. She will study television writing and production. MyLise graduated Cum Laude with an Bachelor's degree in English. Besides academic excellence, MyLise wrote one of the plays performed during the SUNO Drama Club's "A Knight Of ..." production in May. Her one-act play was titled "What's Done in the Dark."

Linda Hill, curator/archivist for the Center for African and African American Studies, and Erica Witt, professional curatorial liaison and interim circulation librarian, were featured in an Aug. 29 "News With A Twist" segment by WGNO reporter Christopher Leech. The segment commemorated and reflected on the impact that Hurricanes Katrina and Rita had on the Campus and the University's African Art Collection. During segment, Ms. Witt, who also is Museum Studies Graduate, and Ms. Hill described how the collection was saved after spending weeks submerged in flood water.

On Aug. 29, Dr. Louis C. Mancuso, a marketing professor, brought students Michael Sentino, Business Administration junior; Kristian Mabens, Business Administration junior; and Brandon Mar, Computer Information Systems senior), Computer Information Systems Chair Dr. David Alijani to the August Metairie Rotary Club Meeting. The main speaker at the meeting was NASA Safety Manager Miguel De Jesus, , who spoke about the United States' new moon rocket launch vehicle project. He also spoke on how the Michoud Assembly Facility in New Orleans East has played an integral role in America's space efforts. The students talked with the Club members before and after the meeting and discussed various opportunities, including internships and full-time employment after graduation.

Dr. Sherry Bachus attended the Gulf Coast Teacher Training Academy at Educare of New Orleans, Aug. 17. She also presented "Concerns in Higher Education: Rise in Mental Health Among College Students" the American Association of Family & Consumer Sciences AAFCS 110th Annual Conference & Expo, St. Lewis, MO, June 22-26.



Dr. Samuel Eweni, associate professor of Computer Information Systems, attended a conference on Blockchain Technology and its implications for the future, hosted by the FinTech Center at Morgan State University in Baltimore, MD in May. The Summit had seven sessions, including a blockchain primer and a panel discussion. The keynote speaker was Kevin Werbach, professor of Legal Studies and Business Ethics at Wharton. He is the author of "The Blockchain and the New Architecture of Trust." Companies with business models based on blockchain technology discussed various use cases.

The Morgan State University Fintech Center is calling for proposals from faculty to include Blockchain content into an existing course or to design a new course. 

Courtney knew that she could not be the only one in the area who had a difficult time finding a trusted dog sitter who understood pet anxiety and depression.

As a Social Worker and recent graduate of Southern University at New Orleans MSW Program, Courtney understood how separation anxiety and depression could play a major role in the lives of children; she found this also to be true with dogs. Courtney combined her years of experience as a Social Worker with her passion for dogs to create a fun and fear-free environment for overly anxious dogs.

Realizing that each dog is different, MaryMac's Doggie Retreat does not utilize the one-size fits all approach. It focuses on reducing anxiety and depression through specialized enrichment activities that include keeping the dogs in smaller group settings, maintaining a 1 to 5 ratio, structured play time with best friends, individualized attention, and tailored activities designed to stimulate the mind while increasing confidence and self-control.

Courtney started her career in Decatur, GA, working in Child Protection Services after she completed her undergraduate degree from Kennesaw State University. In 2015, she returned to New Orleans to work as a substance abuse agency administrator before she decided to step out of her comfort zone and create her own career lane.

**WASHINGTON** -- The U.S. Army appointed seven new Civilian Aides to the Secretary of the Army during an Aug. 12 investiture ceremony here in the Pentagon.

The Honorable Ryan D. McCarthy, Acting Secretary of the Army, selected Dr. Rodney A. Ellis to represent Louisiana (North); Dr. Jeraline M. Johnson to represent Florida (South); Dr. Mark W. Johnson to represent Wyoming; Babejohn 'Babe' Kwasniak to represent Ohio (North); Lance Izumi and Charles "Chuck" Pattillo to represent California (Sacramento); and Tay Yoshitani to represent the State of Washington (West).

"As I looked over your biographies and resumes, I am happy to welcome the best of the best educators and men and women in business to serve on my behalf in your community," McCarthy said. "I am pleased to have each of you help me connect the Army to your community. The Army is a huge organization which means I need a lot of good communicators to tell the Army story. I ask that you visit every corner of your community to support recruiting efforts and help diversify and build the force of the future."

CASAs are a vital part of the Army, promoting good relations between the Army and the public and advising the Secretary about regional issues.

Each state, the District of Columbia and the five U.S. territories have one or more CASAs appointed to provide a vital link between the Army and the communities for which they serve. CASAs are usually business or civic leaders who possess a keen interest in the welfare of the Army and their communities.

CASAs serve a two-year term without compensation. Terms may be extended to a total of 10 years of service. The secretary may recognize a civilian aide as a CASA Emeritus after 10 years of service with distinguished service.

"This opportunity to serve as a CASA, with so many other incredible leaders throughout the nation, provides another avenue in not only supporting my community, but my country," Ellis said, "I am so honored to be selected as a CASA for Northern Louisiana and help the soldiers and families of our proud United States military."

Ellis earned an undergraduate degree in political science from the University of Alabama; a master's degree in judicial administration from Auburn University at Montgomery; and a doctorate degree in higher education administration from the University of Georgia.

Ellis has a distinguished career in the higher education community college sector where he served students he believes come from the most disadvantaged backgrounds but contribute significantly to the growth of this great nation. As chancellor of Southern University at Shreveport — a SUSLA — Ellis said he strives each day to make a specific impact in the African-American and minority communities. SUSLA is one of three campuses of the Southern University System, the only historically black college and university — HBCUs — system in the country. Ellis was also appointed to President Trump's Board of Advisors on HBCUs.

## Southern University at Shreveport Radiologic Technology Students win 2nd Place in the Louisiana Society of Radiologic Technology (LSRT) Quiz Bowl

The SUSLA Radiologic Technology Program are the 2nd place winners of the 62nd Annual Student Prep Quiz Bowl Competition hosted by the Louisiana Society of Radiologic Technologist (LSRT) in Shreveport, Louisiana on July 18, 2019. Each year, accredited Radiologic Technology programs from across the state of Louisiana, form competition teams of six that vie for accolades, a trophy and the coveted Quiz Bowl Championship title for their institution. The purpose of this competition is to encourage student membership in LSRT, to provide healthy competition among student technologists and to recognize those students who demonstrate expertise in radiologic technology theory. Competing Institutions included Northwestern State University, Baton Rouge General, the University of Louisiana at Monroe, McNeese State University, Fran U, Holy Cross, Delgado Community College and Southern University at Shreveport.

To compete on a team, students can only have been enrolled in a program for 14 months or less. Adding more of a challenge for the beginning quiz bowlers, material from all levels of the radiology curriculum is covered during the quiz bowl. To ensure SUSLA students were introduced to and master subjects not yet covered in the classroom, a volunteer coaching staff was developed. Radiology Instructors Benita Lawrence, Toni Moore, Daphne Thibeaux, Yvonne Williams along with Director Shelia Swift, spent well over 200 hours of inside and outside classroom time helping the students prepare for this challenge.

SUSLA Team members included Tia Gage, Marquette Howard, Malory Samuels, Candice Slater, Jeff Yeager, and Moneat Washington. "The students deserve all the credit. Not only did they spend 200 hours or more in a group practice time, but they also diligently studied countless hours on their own just to prepare for our group sessions," says Coaches Lawrence and Thibeaux. SUSLA team member Jeff Yeager credits the teams' success to the commitment of the program instructors. "I just want to say I love each and every one of the Radiologic Technology Program faculty members. Our success at the quiz bowl is because of all the instructors. The hard work of the faculty was a direct reflection on what was accomplished. "Shelia S. Swift, Radiologic Technology Program Director also states, "All students enrolled in SUSLA's program assisted in the teams' training by participating in the mock classroom and quiz bowl style trials."

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

Prior to, Dotson had been serving in the position on an interim basis for the past six months.

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
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
