Drs. Elaasar, Belmasrour, Clement, and Kim are PI and Co_PIs for the Pipeline Development of Skilled Workforce in STEM through Advanced Manufacturing (STEAM) by the DoE/NNSA and have submitted a new Grant for the next five years.

Christian Clement, Mostafa Elaasar, and Dr. Heon Kim Co-PIs have received a one-year extension for the Pipeline Development of Skilled Workforce in STEM through Advanced Manufacturing (STEAM) grant, U. 
Academic Excellence Initiatives



"SUNO's Future Health Care Social Workers In Action"

Dr. Derrick Freeman led the SW HEALS (Healthcare Education and Leadership Scholars) on Sunday, March 6, due to the initiative of one of the scholars, SUNO MSW student Angela Owcsarek, who works with the homeless population. Dr. Freeman and the students distributed information about access to free housing and counseling resources such as hygiene supplies. They provided emotional support to individuals in downtown New Orleans. Dr. Freeman says that according to his research, about 580,466 homeless people live in the United States. He adds that while this number has been steadily decreasing since 2007, it has increased in the last two years (Regan et al., 2021). The culture of New Orleans makes the city a fun place to visit. It is a fact that every spring, the homeless population grows in N.O. due to the increase in visitors who come for festivals and, for numerous reasons, are unable to get themselves home. Social Work HEALS was created to develop the next generation of health care social work leaders who will stand ready to lead efforts to address system-level changes, heighten awareness of prevention and wellness, and address the issues of structural racism that are embedded in social institutions.

The HEALS Scholars program grant funds ended in December 2022, and the scholars continue to demonstrate a commitment to providing leadership and services in social work health care. The students participating are in the photo to the left: Angela Owczarek (MSW student, C/O of 2022) led this event with the involvement of five other HEALS Scholars - MSW students (Gregory Roberts, C/O 2022; Summer Creekbaum, C/O 2022; Paige Logan, C/O 2022; Aunjenee Coner, C/O 2022; and Julia Gobin, C/O 2022), and Dr. Freeman (PI, HEALS Scholars Program). These scholars have the knowledge and skills to point out that effective interventions require targeting those most at risk and have called for creative use of data gathered on the homeless population and better coordination with the City of New Orleans, state institutions, and systems that may be able to identify the antecedents to homelessness. 
• "SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

- FACULTY ENGAGE WITH KIPP
- EAST COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL"



On February 8, 2022, Dr. Freeman (Associate Professor of Social Work) teamed up with the Sixth Grade teachers and students at KIPP East Community Primary School to discuss the importance of college, understanding the HBCU experience, and choosing the right major and profession. KIPP East currently serves grades pre-Kindergarten through 8th and is part of the KIPP New Orleans Schools public charter networks located in New Orleans. Dr. Freeman explained that college is vital for many reasons, including long-term financial gain, job stability, career satisfaction, and success outside of the workplace. He engaged the 30 students in didactic activities and dialogue that highlighted that more and more occupations require advanced education to enter the workforce. During this school event, Dr. Freeman acknowledged that every student has different gifts, needs, and interests and that the students should consider the following factors to help inform their decision - geographic location, academic majors available. educational quality, School size,

cost (affordable), campus environment, available campus resources, and their support systems. Dr. Freeman encouraged the students to start thinking and looking at colleges now and that participation in extracurricular activities (highlighted how this will demonstrate that they are a team-player/involvement), and volunteer ongoing (explained how this can help set you apart from other applicants applying for that college or scholarship award). The students were engaged, eager for knowledge, curious, and highly involved during the visit.



Dr. Rebecca Chaisson, Dean and Monique Hurst, Title IV-E Program Coordinator at Southern University- Millie M. Charles Social of Social Work had the pleasure of hosting Ms. Kamilah Bunn, CEO with the National Adoption Association (NAA). The organization's mission, Leaders Advancing Best Practices in Adoption from Foster Care. The services areas of focus are:

Working with members of Culture AID NOLA, Dr. McKenney and her fellow volunteers packed boxes of fresh fruits, vegetables, canned goods, and other nonperishable items, 5-pound bags of potatoes, and 1 case of fresh drinking water. During this 5-hour event, over 300 families in need were served without question or proof of residency. Participants also were given three free COVID-19 at-home testing kits and hand sanitizer packets. Dr. McKenney plans to invite the SUNO School of Social Work BSW and MSW students to participate in similar Culture AID NOLA events.
