USDA/FAS Staff representing 21 U.S. Embassies visit the SU Ag Center



Twenty-three USDA/ Foreign Agricultural Service agency members representing 21 U.S. Embassies visited the Southern University Ag Center's Research Unit on July 7, 2022 as part of the USDA/Foreign Agricultural Service Locally Employed (LE) Staff Training Tour.

The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) links U.S. agriculture to the world to enhance export opportunities and global food security. This training will assist the LE Staff in their work to support U.S. agricultural exports.

During the visit, the staff learned about several research programs being conducted at the SU Ag Center, including the Cattle SUN Beef Project and Hemp and Viticulture Programs. The staff also toured the Ag Center's research trials at its Horticultural Farm.

"We are excited to host USDA/ FAS," said Dr. Jose Toledo,



SU Ag Center Vice Chancellor of Research. "We hope this visit can translate into future mutually beneficial opportunities, including hosting FAS Scholars and traveling overseas to visit their institutions as well," he added.

The training tour began in Lafayette on July 6 and traveled through Baton Rouge and New Orleans before ending in Washington, D.C. on July 12.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has named thirteen Southern University students as 1890 National Scholars. The Southern University USDA/1890 National Scholars are: Samuel Andrews, Trinity Bridges, Nigel Cole, Tori Eddie, Bradley Hall, Karrington Hall, De'Aree Harris, Amahry Jackson, Christian Jacobs, Odel Kimble, Clarise Preston, Kennede Thomas and Julien Williams.

“With the selection of 133 scholars at nineteen universities, Southern University received the second largest number of scholars, 13. This is the largest number of scholars selected to attend Southern University in 30 years,” said Allison Johnson, USDA National Outreach Coordinator-East and Southern University’s USDA Liaison.

“It is significant that USDA’s Secretary, the Honorable Tom Vilsack, recognized the strength of the 1890 land grant universities to produce the next generation of USDA officials throughout the U.S. This partnership exemplifies a tangible commitment to ensure diversity, equity, and inclusion in the Department of Agriculture by selecting the students that have excelled academically and possess the skills and abilities to become future leaders of our country in the agricultural sector,” added Johnson.

The USDA’s 1890 National Scholars Program was established in 1992 through a partnership between the 1890 Land-Grant Universities and the USDA to increase the number of students studying agriculture,

Harold Mellieon, Jr. Appointed Research Assistant Professor and Academic Coordinator at the SU Ag Center

Dr. Harold Mellieon, Jr. has been appointed the Research Assistant Professor and Academic Coordinator for the SU Ag Center. The appointment was approved by the Southern University Board of Supervisors during its July 15, 2022 board meeting.

Mellieon, who currently serves as the Department Chair and Program Leader for Agricultural Sciences/Animal Sciences for the College of Agricultural, Family and Consumer Sciences (CAFCS) is expected to fill the position on August 1, 2022.

As the Research Assistant Professor and Academic Coordinator, Mellieon will support the research and academic units' daily management, operations, planning, infrastructure, and business functions. This dual position acts as a liaison between the SU Ag Center and CAFCS.

This position will provide direct support in implementing Strategic Research and Academic Programs, and priority needs to be developed by the Vice Chancellor for Research and Academics-Associate Dean.

He currently serves as the Project Director for the Evans Allen Proposal titled: Early and artificial weaning of kids born to does in intensive breeding and diverse system in southeastern Louisiana," and serves as Co-Project Director on two other grants.

"His current work with Research and Academics makes him a natural fit for this position," said Dr. Orlando F. McMeans, Chancellor of the SU Ag Center and Dean of the College of Ag.

Mellieon earned a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture from Southern University A&M College,



a Master's of Animal Sciences from Kansas State University, and a Ph.D. in Agricultural, Extension, & Adult Education, & Online Education from Louisiana State University.

food sciences, natural resource sciences, and other related disciplines.

High school seniors entering their freshman year of college and rising college sophomores and juniors who exhibit exemplary leadership traits and have demonstrated community service are eligible to apply to the highly competitive program.

Students must be U.S. citizens; have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better on a 4.0 scale; have been accepted for admission or currently attending an 1890 University; study agriculture or other related academic disciplines; submit an official transcript; and a signed application to apply to the program.

This scholarship provides registration, full tuition, books, room and board, internships, and full-time employment upon graduation to all scholars.

"The ability to produce a substantial number of well-qualified candidates for consideration, speaks volumes of the agricultural program at Southern University, under the leadership of Drs. Orlando McMeans and Renita Marshall and to the leadership of the Southern University System President-Chancellor, Dennis J. Shields," expressed Johnson.

SU Ag Center Hosted and Celebrated the 20th Annual Morehouse Parish Farm Field Day



Nearly 200 small farmers, youth, and SU and LSU Ag Center staff members participated in the Southern University Ag Center's 20th Annual Morehouse Farm Field Day on July 22, 2022. The event, which was hosted in conjunction with the LSU AgCenter, the Morehouse Black Farmers and Landowners Association, and the National Black Growers Council, was held at Hills Farm, in Bonita, LA.

The field day included presentations on the importance of wills, USDA updates, carbon credits, FMC herbicides, nematodes in soybeans, disease management for corn, and field tours of corn and soybean productions.

"The field day provided new agricultural technology and information to help small farmers expand the life of their farms," said Odis Hill, SU Ag Center Assistant County Agent and field day organizer. "The larger agricultural technology companies brought information on new varieties and the new herbicides as well," added Hill.

The SU Ag Center is teaching Youth Urban Farming and Gardening practices through its D.U.A.L. Program



For the second year, the Southern University Ag Center has held its Demonstration Urban Agricultural Landscapes (D.U.A.L.) Program for youth in Baton Rouge, La. D.U.A.L. is providing student learners from the age of 9 -15 with general garden practices, agricultural technology training, and poultry farming in an urban environment. The program introduces opportunities for relationship and interpersonal skill development, constructive community engagement, informal social control, explorative cognitive and behavioral competencies, and improved nutrition.


The program was held July 9, 16, and 23, 2022, in Tremaine Walker's (a.k.a. the Chicken Man's) garden located behind the GoodLife Hair Studio at 6151 Mickens Rd. The youth received hands-on learning in selecting an urban farm site, preparing the site, planting and tending to the garden, harvesting, ag tech production, and backyard poultry production from the Ag Center's staff.

During the final session, each youth participant received a certificate of completion from the program.

Gardening with children increases their cognitive development as well as intellectual skills such as remembering and analyzing information and predicting outcomes. Community gardens are a great way to get children and young adults to learn about nutrition.

The D.U.A.L. curriculum focuses on promoting community farms and gardens with educational goals to help students, school staff, NGOs, and families make the connection between growing food and animal husbandry, the development of life skills, and increasing environmental awareness.

The PHEFA interns and fellows are students or graduates of Minority Serving Institutions who have demonstrated a commitment




to scientific inquiry and equity.
