SUNO ANNOUNCES OFFICIAL ACADEMIC PARTNERSHIP WITH DELGADO COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO) and Delgado Community College have signed an agreement for an official academic partnership.

At the completion of the associate degree, Delgado graduates will receive guaranteed admission into SUNO at the classification of junior.

The degrees included are the Associate of Arts, Associate of Applied Science, Associate of General Studies, and Associate of Science. These degrees provide a clear pathway of general education and transfer courses, and they represent strong preparation for upper-division coursework in a range of majors.

"This partnership is significant for our University, as we have committed to providing a seamless transition for students looking to further their education and access a 4-year degree. We look forward to welcoming Delgado graduates on our campus and supporting them through their academic and personal endeavors," Dr. James H. Ammons, Jr, SUNO Executive Vice President- Chancellor, said.

SUNO will provide priority housing, out-of-state tuition waivers, and transfer scholarships to eligible Delgado graduates.

Delgado Community College Chancellor Dr. Larissa Littleton Steib and Dr. James H. Ammons, Jr. met Tuesday to sign the official agreement.

"This agreement is great news for our students," said Dr. Larissa Littleton Steib, Chancellor of Delgado Community College. "It enhances Delgado students' ability to make steady, consistent, timely and efficient progress toward a bachelor's degree. Advancing from Delgado's associate degree programs to SUNO's baccalaureate programs will give these students the best possible education to succeed in a broad range of career paths that include some of the region's largest economic drivers."



SUNO ANNOUNCED PLANS FOR ITS \$3M GRANT TO IMPROVE INTERNET ACCESS IN NEW ORLEANS.

Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO) will use part of its \$3M broadband grant to provide internet access to the city of New Orleans during natural disasters and internet outages, and year-round for residents in its surrounding area.

Through this grant, the SUNOConnects program will install WiFi towers on its campus and send enhanced signals to residents within a 15-mile radius. The University will also pilot a mobile hotspot unit to deliver broadband internet access to the digitally disadvantaged, provide internet to students interested in dual enrollment, and provide education and outreach to schools, community centers, and churches to improve broadband and internet literacy.

"The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted the importance of digital connectivity. As New Orleans is ranked one of the worst-connected cities in America, we understand the critical role our University will play in bridging the digital divide and ensuring equitable access in our campus community and within the city of New Orleans," James H. Ammons, Jr, Southern University System Executive Vice President & SUNO Chancellor, said.

As SUNO expands its broadband capacity, additional job opportunities will be available at the University, as well as training for faculty, staff, students, and New Orleans residents.

The grant was issued by the Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration's (NTIA) Connecting Minority Communities Pilot Program (CMC).

The Connecting Minority Communities Pilot Program is a \$268 million grant program awarded to Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs), and Minority-Serving

Institutions (MSIs).

Community Healers Collaborative – sponsored by the Institute of Mental Hygiene

The Center for Grief & Trauma Therapy, led by Dr. Torin T. Sanders, LCSW, Associate Professor of Social Work, received a grant from the Institute of Mental Hygiene (IMH) to begin the "Community Healers Collaborative." Housed at the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work, the Community Healers Collaborative will be a part of the Center's work, extending its mission to allow for training on grief and trauma to lay members of the New Orleans community (coaches, pastors, parents, etc.) as they often are "immediate responders" to those undergoing life's most difficult challenges. This grant will fund the development of a certificate program in Grief & Trauma Therapy for mental health professionals in the Greater New Orleans area, improving the capacity of the local workforce.

AWARDS

GRANTS AND RESEARCH

Under the leadership of Dr. Tonya Rose, the College of Education and Human Development was awarded \$183,000 from the Board of Regents to develop a Dual Enrollment Teacher Certification program. The College was also awarded \$79,000 from the Board of Regents to develop a Postsecondary Inclusion Program. The "Exceptional Knights Program" will be designed for postsecondary students with intellectual disabilities to continue academic, career, technical, and independent living instruction to prepare for employment.
